tory, focusing on the last 25 years.

South Sioux City Centennial Cookbook, 1887-1987 is a commemorative cookbook from the centennial celebration.

South Sioux City High School Cardinal: We have a select number of yearbooks available for a stroll down memory lane, or to do a little serious research. BANNED BOOKS WEEK READATHON

In commemoration of Banned Books Week in the United States, South Sioux City Public Library will host two events.

On Monday September 23rd, Library Director, Dave Mixdorf will present a discussion on Banned Books Week.

On Tuesday September 24th we will host a Read-a-Thon from 9:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.

We invite people to sign-up

and come to the library to read banned books. Readers will read to themselves and the times are in 15-minute segments.

Banned Books Week is the national book community's annual celebration of the freedom to read. Hundreds of libraries and bookstores around the country draw attention to the problem of censorship by mounting displays of challenged books and

hosting a variety of events. Banned Books Week was launched in 1982 in response to a sudden surge in the number of challenges to books in schools, bookstores and li-More than 11,300 braries books have been challenged since 1982. According to the American Library Association, there were 326 challenges reported to the Office of Intellectual Freedom in 2011, and many more go unreported.

Happy, Happy, Happy by Phil Robertson is written by, and about, Phil from the show Duck Dynasty. If you are a fan of the show, you will definitely like this book. The story follows Phil from his very poor childhood, his master's degree, his bout with drinking and then quitting, and lastly how he turned his idea for a duck call into the Duck Dynasty. I learned a lot about Phil's life and a little more about ducks than I wanted to, but overall this was an excellent book!


"Habibi" a graphic novel by Craig Thompson. Craig's beautiful and intricate artwork flows across the pages of this book that is part coming of age story, part love story, and part Arabian Nights. This book follows two young children, Dodola and Zam, sold into slavery. They

manage to escape one night and create a life for themselves in the harsh desert. One day many years later, Dodola is captured, unbeknownst to Zam. Will the two ever reunite? Will Zam ever be able to find a way to express his love to the woman who once saved his life? With such a gripping storyline, enhanced by amazing artwork, I would recommend this book as an introduction to what graphic novels can be.

Inside Apple: How America's Most Admired- and Secretive-Company Really Works by Adam Lashiinsky takes an historic look inside Apple with this study. The author covers the history of the company, from its beginning to the death of Steve Jobs. The reader discovers how the personality of Steve Jobs is infused

into everything Apple does. In the end he makes some observations about the possible future of the company. (This is based on the audiobook version of the book).

The Tipping Point: How Little Things Make a Big Difference by Malcolm Gladwell. This book looks at the subject of trends, ,more precisely, what makes things go viral. He covers a diverse number of examples from skateboarder fashion, to the popularity of Rebecca Wells's book The Divine Secrets of the Ya-Ya Sisterhood. In the end he deals with how urban legends take hold in a culture, the possibility of immunity to viral trends and much more. (Based on the audiobook version of the book.)
