Mad Science delivers unique, hands-on science experiments, that are as entertaining as they are educational.


This year we are inviting the adults to get in on the fun. Of course, there is no charge for this event.

CHILDREN'S FICTION RECOMMENDATIONS

We are half-way through the Summer Reading Program. Here are a few fiction recommendations you will want to read.

My Big Fat Zombie Goldfish: the Sequel by Mo O'Hara. After Tom rescued Frankie the goldfish from his big brother Mark's toxic science experiment by zapping him back to life with a battery, Frankie somehow became a BIG FAT ZOMBIE GOLDFISH with dangerous hypnotic powers.

The Impossible Shrinking Machine: and Other Stories by Seymour Simon. Sixth-grade sleuth Adam "Einstein" Anderson uses his scientific knowledge to solve a variety of puzzles, including a machine that makes things shrink.

The Fall of Five by Pittacus Lore. After facing off with the Mogadorian ruler and almost being annihilated, the Garde go into hiding. They must learn to master their Legacies and learn to work together as a team.

When they receive a sign from Number Five -- a crop circle in the shape of a Loric symbol -- they know they are close to being reunited. But could it be a trap?

The Case of the Disappearing Dogs: a Club CSI Novel by David Lewman. Hannah, Ben, and Corey combine what they have learned in their forensic science class with investigative skills to find Hannah's missing dog.

CHILDREN'S NONFICTION RECOMMENDATIONS



If you would rather read nonfiction, here are a few titles you will enjoy.

Aliens by Jim Pipe. This book examines reported encounters with alien beings, including UFOs, alien abductions, and government cover-ups.

Elephant Talk: The Surprising Science of Elephant Communications by Ann Downer. Presents an introduction to elephants, describing their different types, habitat, herd behavior, how they communicate using sound, touch,

and bodily movement, and the dangers they face from illegal poaching.

Weird Meat-Eating Plants by Nathan Aaseng. Introduces readers to the different varieties of carnivorous plants, where they live, how and why the trap their prey, and more.

Bloodsucking Creatures by Ron Knapp. Examines animals that feed on blood, including mosquitoes, vampire bats, lice, leeches, lampreys, and fleas, and looks at their anatomy, behavior, and interactions with people. Using Scientific Tools by Susan Meredith introduces readers to a number of scientific tools. Ripley's Believe It or Not: Strikingly True by Geoff Tibballs A compendium of incredible and bizarre facts, stories, interviews and features. Includes a dramatic eightpage gatefold section presenting Ripley's first ever odditorium.

David and Goliath: Underdogs, Misfits, and the Art of Battling Giants by Malcolm Gladwell

Malcolm Gladwell uses a popular story from the Hebrew scriptures to explore why in many cases weakness is often a strength, when it is used well. Gladwell goes from the popular stories to look at how weakness proves to be strength

in areas like the civil rights movement, war, and cancer research. He goes on to explain how disadvantage, can prove to be an advantage in the classroom. Gladwell's work brings a philosophical bent to motivation/ success literature. While he does not write a "rah-rah" motivational book, the work is readable and thoroughly engrossing.


Killing Jesus: a History by Bill O'Really and Martin Dugard

Killing Jesus is the third of his Killing... series. O'Reilly weaves the history of the Roman world around the common era along with the biblical text to look at those who had a hand in the crucifixion of Christ.

Bill O'Reilly and Martin Dugard weave a compelling story

around an event that is well known to many readers. O'Reilly stays true to the source materials while telling the story. He crafted a story that was a good historical suspense novel, but it does not fall into being a Christian apologetic.

The Lost Symbol by Dan Brown. In the novel Robert Langdon is sent for by Peter Solomon to give a last minute speech. In the course of the story Langdon and a smart, beautiful scientist are drug into a scavenger hunt of symbols around the D.C. area in order to thwart a larger than life bad guy who wants to gain information that only Robert Langdon can uncover.
