#### January is Stalking Awareness Month

In 2003, Congress established January as National Stalking Awareness Month. Many of us in the community may never experience this form of violence. However, 3.4 million people who are over 18 are stalked every year. (Baum et al., (2009). "Stalking Victimization in the United States." BJS.)

Stalking is a repeated pattern of behaviors directed at a specific person which causes the person to be fearful. This conduct can include but is not limited to, direct or indirect threats to harm the victim, victim's family, friends, children, or pets, unwanted and frightening communications from the stalker by mail, phone, or email, following the victim, sending the victim unwanted gifts, damaging victim's property, tracking the victim's whereabouts with hidden cameras or global positioning systems (GPS), monitoring victim's computer by spyware software, finding out information through public records, online searches, or going through victim's garbage. Stalkers can be strangers, acquaintances, friends, co-workers, current or former spouses, and boy-

For a victim of stalking the impact of the unwanted intrusion varies from person to person however some responses may include:

Fear -leaving the house at night, the phone ringing, or being by themselves;

Stress-unable to concentrate, easily distracted or worried, or forgetting things;

friends/girlfriends. 3 in 4 stalking victims are stalked by someone they know (Baum et al.)

**Anxiety**-constantly looking over their shoulder, safety of family members, whether or not the stalking will stop. **Nervousness**-being on edge, irritable, startled by small things, or jumpy;

Hyper vigilance-always on high alert to the known and unknown dangers or continually checking locks on doors and windows.

If you are a victim of stalking taking precautions to protect your safety can include varying your daily routine, changing travel routes, always being in the company of family or friends, carrying pepper spray or mace, & protecting personal information. Victims of stalking should put in place a safety plan and to always trust their "gut feeling" or instinct.

Here are some ways victims can document what the stalker is doing:

- 1. Contact & work with law enforcement to report any and all situations that involve the stalker.
- 2. Keep a written journal or record of events and be specific to the behaviors exhibited and what took place.
- 3. Keep any letters, photos, video, voicemail, text messages, packages, etc., you received from the stalker.
- 4. Videotape the stalker if coming to your house, following you in your car, coming to your job, etc...
- 5. Educate yourself about stalkers and stalking behaviors

### CHILD CARE TAX CREDIT ACT

### Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 77-7201 to 77-7205

\*LB 754 (Sections 1 through 5, Operative for taxable years beginning on or after January 1, 2024.)

This Act establishes two separate tax credits for tax years beginning on or after January 1, 2024, that require taxpayers to submit an application to DOR.

Nebraska parents and legal guardians of children 5 years old or younger may soon be eligible for a new refundable child care tax credit under the Child Care Tax Credit Act, which takes effect for tax years beginning January 1, 2024. The state Department of Revenue (DOR) has outlined the steps for parents to apply for the tax credit, which will be available through an online application system called the Electronic Document & Application Submission Hub (eDASH). The application portal will open on January 2, 2025, allowing parents to apply for the credit for tax year 2024. To qualify for the credit, parents or guardians must meet certain criteria. The child must be 5 years old or younger as of December 31 of the year for which the credit is requested and must be claimed as a dependent on the parent's federal income tax return. Additionally, the household income must not exceed \$150,000.

#### **Sidewalks**

To ensure the safety of all South Sioux City pedestrians it is required that:

All sidewalks within the business district be cleaned within 5 hours after the cessation of a storm, unless the storm, or fall of snow, has taken place during the night; in which case the sidewalk shall be cleaned before 8:30 a.m. the next morning.

Sidewalks within the residential areas MUST be cleaned within 12 hours after the cessation of any storm.

Residences cannot push sidewalk or parking or driveway snow onto any city street.

Only Dakota Ave businesses may move their sidewalk snow onto Dakota Ave, prior to, snow removal off Dakota Ave by the City, and NO PARKING LOT snow can be pushed onto Dakota Avenue at any time.

#### **Banquetas**

Para garantizar la seguridad de todos los residentes de South Sioux City, se requiere que:

Todas las banquetas dentro del distrito comercial sean limpiadas dentro de las 5 horas posteriores al terminar la tormenta, a menos que la tormenta o la caída de nieve hayan tenido lugar durante la noche; en cuyo caso la banqueta se limpiará antes de las 8:30 a.m. de la mañana siguiente.

Las banquetas dentro de las áreas residenciales DEBEN limpiarse dentro de las 12 horas posteriores al terminar cualquier tormenta.

Los residentes no pueden empujar la nieve de las banquetas, los estacionamientos o las entradas de vehículos hacia ninguna calle de la ciudad.

Solo los negocios de Dakota Ave pueden trasladar la nieve de las banquetas a Dakota Ave, antes de que la Ciudad retire la nieve de Dakota Ave, y NO se puede empujar hacia Dakota Avenue en ningún momento la nieve del estacionamiento.

#### REMINDER ATV/UTV/GOLF CART PERMITS IN CITY STREETS

Reminder that 2025 ATV/UTV/GOLF CART registrations are now available.


New initial registrations will receive one permit year sticker and a license plate. Renewal registrations shall receive a permit year sticker only, that should be placed on the original license plate. The license plate should be affixed on the rear of the ATV/UTV/GOLF CART and the year permit sticker should be placed on the plate's top right corner.

To register ATV/UTV/GOLF CART's, you will need to call the LEC (494-7555) and an officer will be sent to do the inspection. ATV/UTV/GOLF CART's must be inspected yearly and permits are not transferrable. Once the inspection is complete, the officer will direct the individual to take the completed form to City Hall and pay the \$25 annual registration fee. Police and Community Service Officers will be issuing tickets to any ATV/UTVGOLF CART that is not displaying the current 2025 permit.

UTILITY-TYPE VEHICLE DOES NOT INCLUDE LOW-SPEED VEHICLES, RIDING LAWNMOWER OR MOTORIZED WHEELCHAIRS.
