### TIE ONE ON FOR SAFTEY



In 35 years MADD has made great strides to end drunk driving, help fight drugged driving, prevent underage drinking, and supporting and advocating for victims. When MADD was founded in 1980 more than 25,000 people were killed on our roadways each year by drunk drivers. Some of the most dangerous days of the year on our nation's roadways are between Thanksgiving and New Years. Tie One On For Safety is a campaign which began in 1986. During the holiday season MADD asks

drivers to display a red ribbon in a visible location to remind individuals to ALWAYS designate a non-drinking driver. The name comes from the slang term "tie one on" for drinking alcohol.

Even though great strides have been made to end drunk-driving families who have lost loved ones suffer the most. In 2023 12,429 individuals were killed in drunk-driving crashes, which means every 42 minutes someone's family has lost a loved one. According to the Nebraska Office of Highway Safety, in 2020, Nebraska had 76 alcohol related deaths. Further, during the holiday season (November & December) there were 238 alcohol related crashes. This accounts for 5 crashes per day on Nebraska roadways.

If you would like to participate this holiday season in MADD's efforts here are several ideas: Putting safety before the party and always designate a non-drinking driver BEFORE the celebration begins to ensure everyone arrives home safely. Display a MADD red ribbon in a visible location on your vehicles. Red ribbons, magnets, and window decals are available through MADD local office at: 770 North Cotner Blvd, #325, Lincoln, NE 68505.

Make it Click: it's about saving lives.

During the Thanksgiving holiday weekend in 2023 (6p.m. on Wednesday, November 22, to 5:59 a.m. on Monday, November 27), there were 309 passenger vehicle occupants killed in traffic crashes across the nation and 44% (135) were unrestrained. Not wearing a seat belt proved to be deadly at any time of the day during the Thanksgiving holiday weekend in 2023; 47% of those killed in nighttime crashes were unbuckled, and 38% of those killed in daytime crashes also were unbuckled.





Wastewater agencies spend up to \$441 million annually to clean up unexpected clogs and equipment damage from the wrong wipes going down the drain. The usual suspects? Items that never should have been flushed in the first place, like paper towels, non-flushable wipes, and feminine products.

Many people overlook the impact of their flushing habits on home plumbing and community infrastructure. This may be due in part to a long history of confusing labeling; however, current legislation aims to rectify this issue.

DO NOT

California, Illinois, Washington, Oregon, Colorado, New Jersey, and Michigan have passed laws requiring non-flushable wipes, such as baby wipes, cleaning and disinfecting wipes, and other wipes not intended for flushing, to have the Do Not Flush symbol clearly displayed on packaging. Similar legislation, known as the WIPPES Act, is currently under review at the federal level.

Considering that these Do Not Flush wipes make up around 90% of wipes sold in the U.S., educating your area residents to check the wipe packaging for the symbol and other disposal instructions is key to protecting your infrastructure.

But changing behavior is notoriously difficult, even when presented with the facts. Fifty-one percent of people admit they've flushed something they knew they shouldn't, feeling that just one baby wipe wouldn't make a difference.
