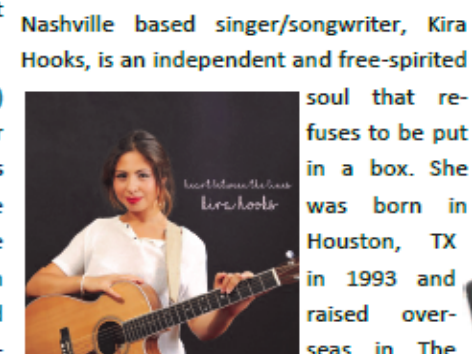

Shrek (July 23rd & 28th) A reclusive ogre and a chatterbox donkey go on a quest to rescue a princess for a tyrannical lord.

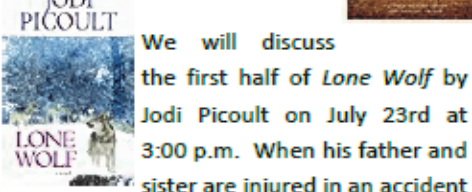

Kira Hooks at the Redbird Café, July 12th at 7:00 p.m.



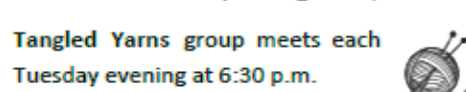

Mosquito Spraying In South Sioux City

The City of South Sioux City will again be conducting aerial spraying operations this summer in an effort to decrease the population of larval mosquitoes. Mosquitoes are more than a nuisance. Operations will take place in the early morning hours. This is only done periodically and is weather dependent. This may occur periodically through-out the late spring, summer, and early fall, and up to 10-12 times. The material used is listed below.

Vectobac 12AS. This larvicide is not toxic to bees, butterflies, dragonflies, etc. The chemical does not pose a risk to humans, according to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and the Center for Disease Control.

The aerial spraying efforts are aimed at freshwater woodland, flood-pool, swamp, and open field-breeding mosquitoes and will have little effect on backyard container-breeding species.

The City of South Sioux City also conducts fogging for mosquitoes down the streets of the City. This too is very weather dependent. This process kills adult mosquitoes. It is done during the early morning hours.

GARAGE SALES

No person shall operate, conduct, manage or permit a garage sale upon his, her or its premises or other property under his, her or its control more often than two (2) times per calendar year and said sale shall not be continued for a period of more than three (3) consecutive days. No sale shall be conducted before 8:00 a.m. or after 8:00 p.m. Outdoor garage sales are permitted only in areas zoned for residential use (R-Zones) Indoor only garage sales may be conducted in areas zoned for commercial use (C-Zones) or manufacturing use (M-Zones). You must receive a garage sale permit in advance at City Hall during regular office hours, Monday-Friday, 9am-5pm. There is no fee for the permit.

The licensee is allowed to post three off premise signs advertising the garage sale and the signs must be removed by the licensee by 5:00 p.m. on the last day of the sale. No sign shall be attached to any utility pole, light pole, tree or any other public facility located within the public right-of-way. The purpose of this is to prevent people from having perpetual garage sales at their garage home and creating parking problems with the neighbors

Hello everyone, hope your summer is going well and you are enjoying the great weather. With everything that has been going on around the city, we are lucky this spring has been so nice. I would like to visit with you about the following items: Cardinal Days Festival, Anderson Farms grain elevator, changes at City Hall and the boys state soccer championship.

South Sioux City (SSC) enjoyed another great year this past weekend with the Cardinal Days Festival. There were many activities and a parade over the course of the weekend. Jim Steele and Gene Maffit, and many other volunteers, did an outstanding job coordinating the event. The street band, parade, drive in movie, bouncy houses, Spanish Dancers and much more, all made for a great event. I would like to see the movie wall and stage utilized more often as a community; it is such a great asset to have.

The Anderson Grain elevator explosion of a few days ago, reminded me of the old McMaster grain elevator explosion in the early 80’s. No one ever expects these types of events to occur, but they obviously do. To no one’s surprise, the SSC Fire and Police Departments responded as they always do, quickly, safely and professionally. They were on the scene within minutes and the situation was under control to the extent that it could be. Unfortunately, there were some injuries, but thankfully no fatalities. However, part of the collateral damage was the evacuation of twenty-six homes and one long time business. Thankfully, the elevator is now down and the residents can get back into their homes and businesses when the situation has been deemed safe. I would also like to recognize the many surrounding area Fire Departments such as Dakota City, Homer, Winnebago etc. who came to our aide and offered us their services. SSC Fire Chief Clint Merithew, Police Chief Ed Mahon and Dakota County Emergency Management Director Deanna Hagberg have all done an outstanding job, working around the clock to ensure the city’s safety. There are many more people that have helped just too numerous to name them all but we appreciate each and every one of them.

Many changes are happening inside city hall as well. I recently appointed long time Councilman, Oscar Gomez to be the new Assistance City Administrator and the City Council unanimously approved. On a disappointing note, the city lost the services of two long time, excellent employees who have moved on to pursue other interests, Kelly Flynn, Economic and Community Development Director and Tami Bailey, Grant Writer and Administrator. The recent changes at City Hall were very significant. The City has been without an Assistant City Administrator since Joe Johnson left in 2011. Lance Hedquist, our City Administrator, does an excellent job, but at some point will want to retire, thus our decision to hire another Assistant City Administrator, Oscar Gomez. Oscar has extensive knowledge of the city and brings many years of banking and finance experience to the position. We are all very excited to get Lance some relief and let Oscar get started.

As I mentioned earlier, Tami Bailey and Kelly Flynn will be leaving the City. Tami will bring her many talents to a private business and Kelly will become the new Head Girls’ Basketball coach and a teacher at Fremont High School in Fremont NE. I have no doubt they will both be successful in their new endeavors. On a side note, Kelly Flynn has been a very close personal friend of mine for many years, his humor and upbeat personality will be missed by many in SSC. Fremont will not only be getting a Hall of Fame basketball coach, but more importantly, a quality individual as well. Good luck to Kelly and Barb.

Finally, SSC High School won the 2018 Boys State Soccer Championship, what an outstanding accomplishment. Lupe Gonzalez, the head soccer coach at SSC High School, and his team made all of SSC proud a few weeks ago by winning the very competitive state soccer title. The hard work and dedication of the coaching staff and these fine young men was clearly commendable. The team and coaches were honored at the City Council meeting tonight. They are exceptional young men and I believe that with all the kids coming back next year, they may win it again!

Summer Heat Safety Tips

After the last couple weeks of hot temperatures and heat indices it is important to remember some summer heat safety tips. Everyone should follow basic heat safety tips to avoid the dangers of heat exposure.

- Drink plenty of water and other fluids.
- Avoid drinking alcohol and beverages that are carbonated or have caffeine.
- Dress lightly
- Keep curtains and blinds pulled to block direct sunlight.
- NEVER leave a pet or person in the vehicle in hot conditions.
- Remember your pets during the hot summer days and make sure they have a cool and shady place to go. Remember to keep fresh water available for your pets.
- Supervise children when playing outdoors, be sure monitor often.
- Avoid using the oven and stove during the hot hours of the day. Use slow cookers and grills.
- Check on your neighbors especially the elderly.
 - Visit your elderly neighbors and family members often during the days
 - If they don’t have air conditioning help locate areas they could go during the hot time of the day.
- It is important to recognize signs of heat exhaustion and heatstroke.
