Finding Nemo (Aug 6th, 11th) The fretful Marlin and his young son Nemo become separated

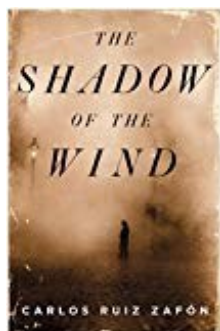

Cover to Cover Book Club is open to all participants. We meet on the second and fourth Monday of each month at 3:00 p.m.

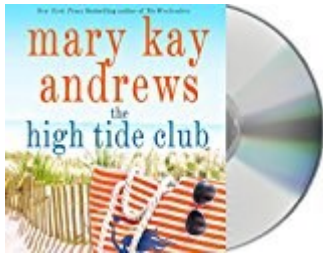

MEET LIBBY

This is from the Nebraska Library Commission.

I've received several recent calls/ emails asking about the new OverDrive Libby app. OverDrive just started promoting Libby more prominently on our Nebraska OverDrive Libraries website, which is why I think patrons are suddenly starting to ask library staff about it. To help you better answer those questions if they come your way, here's a brief overview of what the Libby app is, and links you can follow to learn more:

Libby is a new, alternative downloadable app that can be used to read and listen to OverDrive eBooks and audiobooks. It's been around for a while in beta, but OverDrive is starting to push it more. The old, familiar OverDrive app still works—in fact, it's the only app that will work on some older operating systems—but Libby is a new option for users. It is designed to be more streamlined, and if someone is new to OverDrive, and they have a device that will work with Libby, OverDrive

recommends starting them out with the Libby app. However, there are currently no plans to get rid of the old app.

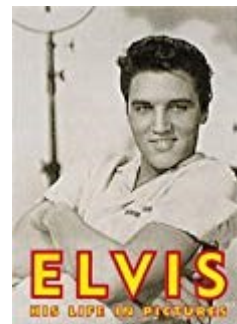

THE WIZARD OF OZ PREMIERS, AUGUST 12

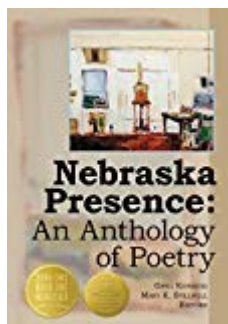

Nebraska Presence: An Anthology of Poetry

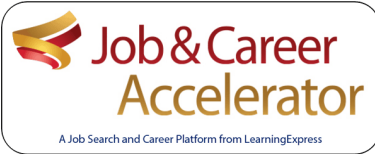

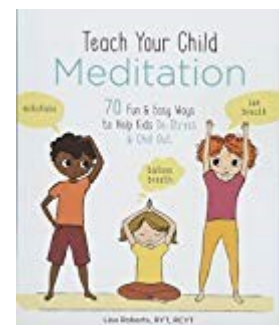

Be Prepared by Vera Brosgol, We recently got in a new graphic novel called "Be Prepared" by Vera Brosgol.

It's about a young girl trying to find her place where she just doesn't fit in. She finds out there is a camp full of kids who share her family's culture and she is excited to finally feel "normal". To her surprise, it isn't as easy as she expects. Young Vera encounters wild animals, bullies,

The Kid by Ron Hansen; Ron Hansen writes a fast-paced, historical fiction, biography of Billy the Kid in *The Kid*. Hansen begins with the origins of his family in Ireland, their immigration to the United States, as well as his mother's battle to raise a family. The author follows Billy as he leaves home to raise try to make a living on his own. The reader gets a look at his work life as cowboy in the Southwest and in Mexico. I found little nuggets that I had never considered, like when Jesse James went to New Mexico to recruit

the Kid for his gang after the Northfield, Minnesota bank robbery. These things may be totally fictional, but it added color to the novel. Readers of westerns will love this book. Lovers of western history will love this too.—Dan Nieman\
