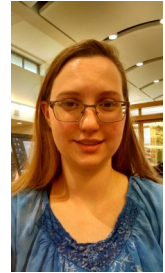

August Movies

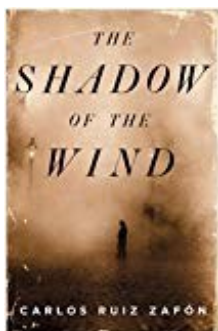
Family Movies Monday at 4 p.m. Saturday at 1 p.m.

"Born Henry McCarty, Billy the Kid was a diminutive, charming, blond-

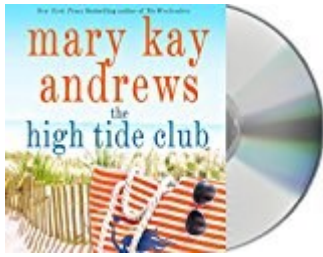

Guidelines for choosing books for babies

- Newborns are drawn to bold and starkly contrasting colors. They also enjoy geometric patterns, shiny surfaces, and noisy or "crackly" textures.
- Keep in mind that you don't have to wait until birth to begin reading books to children. From the seventh month of fetal development, your baby can hear what's going on outside the womb, especially the sound of your voice. While reading to your unborn baby, you may

notice she'll respond by kicking and moving, the first of many interactions with you. By the time she enters the world, she'll be primed for many more shared stories to help her reap the benefits of early literacy.

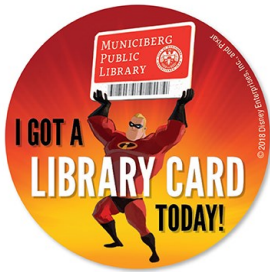

SEPTEMBER IS LIBRARY CARD SIGN-UP MONTH



Free library cards are provided for South Sioux City residents.

A person must be at least 16 years of age to obtain a card without a parent or guardian. If younger, a parent or guardian must sign the application form. Children under five (5) cannot get a library card.

Complete the application form at the library's front desk
Show 2 forms of appropriate identification with current ad-

dress (valid driver's license or state identification, bill, mail addressed to applicant at current address)

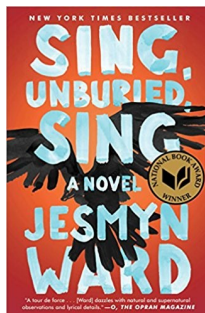
New customers may check out a maximum of five (5) items at a time for the first three (3) months.

If a library card is lost, a \$1.00 replacement fee will be charged.

Out of city residents have the opportunity to purchase a library

card for \$75.00 annually (per household) and utilize all of the library's materials.

ALA Notable Books Fiction

ALA NOTABLE BOOKS (FICTION)

The American Library Association recommends a list of books each year. These are some of the notable fiction titles.

Stay with Me by Ayobami Adebayo. Secrets and loss torment a modern Nigerian couple.

The Last Ballad by Wiley Cash. A fateful decision puts a mother on a collision course with history during a 1929 textile mill strike in North Carolina.

“Less” by Andrew Sean Greer.

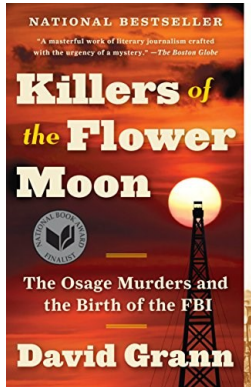
Lee A fifty-year old novelist experiences a second coming-of-age in this madcap romp through the literary world.

“Pachinko” by Min Jin Lee. This immersive multigenerational saga follows a Korean family in Twentieth Century Japan.

Lincoln in the Bardo by George Saunders. Three characters stuck in an ambiguous limbo after their deaths narrate the story of the president's visits to the graveyard following the tragic loss of his

son.

Sing, Unburied, Sing by Jesmyn Ward. A lyrical and psychologically astute exploration of the gravity of history that still ripples through the lives of a Mississippi family.



ALA NOTABLE NONFICTION

You Don't Have to Say You Love Me: A Memoir by Sherman Alexie. A deeply moving memoir about a son's complicated relationship with his mother told in seventy-eight poems and seventy-eight essays.

Hue 1968: A Turning Point of the American War in Vietnam by Mark Bowden. A multiple perspective account of what proved to be a decisive moment in a conflict that is indelibly marked on the American psyche.

The Best We Could Do: An Illustrated Memoir by Thi Bui. A first generation immigrant reflects on her family history in this nonfiction graphic novel. "Grant" by Ron Chernow. In this definitive biography, new scholarship illuminates the life of a complex American president.

Killers of the Flower Moon: The Osage Murders and the Birth of the FBI by David Grann. A combination of history and true crime, in which a Native Ameri-

can tribe is defrauded and nearly eradicated.

Radium Girls: The Dark Story of America's Shining Women by Kate Moore. In early twentieth century watch factories, dial painters suffer the deterioration of their bodies and fight to pave the way for workplace safety standards.

The Blood of Emmett Till by Timothy Tyson. Drawing on new information, the author returns to the 1955 lynching of an African American boy in Mississippi.

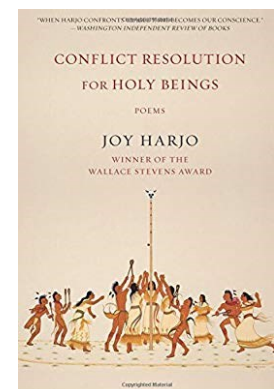
