Harry Potter and the Sorcerer's Stone

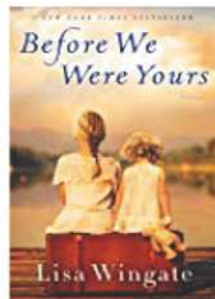

Bill McLarty resigned from South Sioux City Council after decades of public service and three terms as the city's mayor in 2012. McLarty and his wife Barbara have been residents of South Sioux City since 1963 when he started teaching at the local high school. He retired from his military career in 1987, and he retired in 1996 from the Sioux City Community School District as Director of Human Resources.

GARAGE SALES

No person shall operate, conduct, manage or permit a garage sale upon his, her or its premises or other property under his, her or its control more often than two (2) times per calendar year and said sale shall not be continued for a period of more than three (3) consecutive days. No sale shall be conducted before 8:00 a.m. or after 8:00 p.m. Outdoor garage sales are permitted only in areas zoned for residential use (R-Zones) Indoor only garage sales may be conducted in areas zoned for commercial use (C-Zones) or manufacturing use (M-Zones). You must receive a garage sale permit in advance at City Hall during regular office hours, Monday-Friday, 9am-5pm. There is no fee for the permit.

The licensee is allowed to post three off premise signs advertising the garage sale and the signs must be removed by the licensee by 5:00 p.m. on the last day of the sale. No sign shall be attached to any utility pole, light pole, tree or any other public facility located within the public right-of-way. The purpose of this is to prevent people from having perpetual garage sales at their garage home and creating parking problems with the neighbors

NOTICE PROPERTY OWNERS AND OCCUPANTS OF SOUTH SIOUX CITY 8” Weeds, Grasses or Worthless Vegetation Removal and Litter Nuisance Ordinance No. 2013-17

City ordinance 2013-17 states in part “The owner or occupant of any lot or piece of ground shall keep the lot or piece of ground and the adjoining street and alleys free of any growth of eight (8”) inches or more in height of weeds, grasses or worthless vegetation or to litter or cause litter to be deposited or remain thereon”. In the event a property owner or occupant fails to abate the nuisance, the City shall have such work done and all costs associated with the nuisance abatement shall be the responsibility of the property owner. In addition to the costs associated with the nuisance abatement, fines shall be levied as follows:

- 1st Violation - \$100.00
- 2nd Violation - \$200.00
- 3rd Violation - \$500.00

The City of South Sioux City is reaching out to our water users to encourage water conservation. We will begin by addressing some ideas for the residential users. Not only can this save our precious resource of water but it will save on your water bill.

Home Owners:

At your home, survey all the areas where water lines run or where water is used. Sinks, tubs/showers, and toilets can leak a lot of water in hidden locations of the house. Repair those leaks immediately. You would be surprised how much a drip will lose for 24hours/ seven days a week. When you have to replace toilets or any new installations, highly consider the “low volume” units. Over time this can save a considerable amount of water. Generally this type of toilet saves 1.6 gallon per flush. The same thing goes for clothes washers and dish washers. Read the product information before you purchase. All machines claim that they conserve water. When members of your household use water for brushing teeth, showers, and general use, have them conserve water by turning off the water when not using. Again this can save a bunch of water. If you water your lawn with permanent sprinklers or with a sprinkler and hoses, watch for leaks and over watering. For the permanent sprinklers, there are “Smart Systems”. These systems only water when needed and thus saving considerable water.

Commercial/Industrial

We strongly your facility develops a “water conservation plan”. This plan should address all uses of water. The plan needs to have a way to look at efficiencies for the large water usages. Also the plan should address how do handle losses through leaks and capital replacement program.
