C. DANIEL BOLING, DOUG E. REES LIVE @ THE REDBIRD CAFE

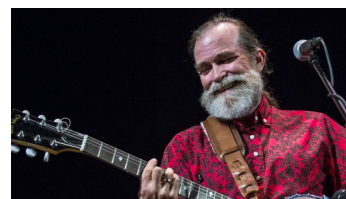
C. Daniel Boling Live @ the Redbird Café: C. Daniel Boling will perform at the library café on Thursday, May 2nd at 7:00 p.m. C. Daniel Boling is the 2014 Winner of the prestigious Grassy Hill Kerrville New Folk songwriter contest, Daniel shares experiences from a life well-lived in places as far-ranging as Japan, Okinawa, and Padre Island, Texas. With his well-crafted story songs and friendly tenor this balladeer / songwriter delights audiences coast-to-coast in over one hundred shows a year, from House Concerts and listening rooms to major festivals (Kerrville, Winfield, Woody Guthrie, and others).

Born into a traveling Air Force family, he later worked as a National Park Ranger (yes, the gun-toting kind) and as a Criminal Investigator for the US Bu-

reau of Land Management. He started touring at 50, an age when most guys are planning their retirement. He's released seven albums since 1999 -- the most recent, *THESE HOUSES*, was produced by Jono Manson and released April of 2016 on the Berkalin Records songwriter label.

Daniel's songs tell interesting stories about a variety of unusual characters, including himself. He plays the guitar and banjitar (a banjo/guitar hybrid) with a deft fingerpicking style that always enhances the stories, and a bit of harmonica into the bargain. His clear tenor draws positive comparisons to John Denver and Pete Seeger, and like Pete, Daniel is happiest when his audiences sing too! A \$10 suggested donation will be taken to provide funds for the musician.

Doug E. Rees performs on Monday, May 6th @ 7:00 p.m. Doug started his professional music career in Nashville. He found a comfortable niche among the many talented singer/songwriters playing a variety of acoustic venues, honing his songwriting skills fusing folk, country, blues and pop influences into his own unique style. Now based out of Missouri, he continues to write and record while appearing at many house concerts and listening rooms around the country. "You can't put genre' next to Doug's name" a fan once said. COVER TO COVER “VARINA” BY CHARLES FRAZIER

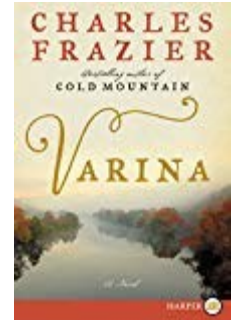
Cover to Cover book club will discuss the book *Varina* by Charles Frazier on Monday, May 13th at 2:00 p.m.

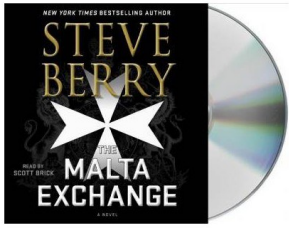

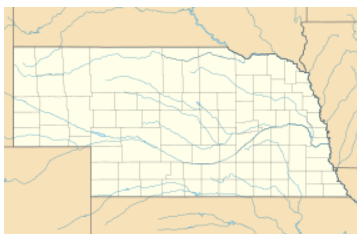

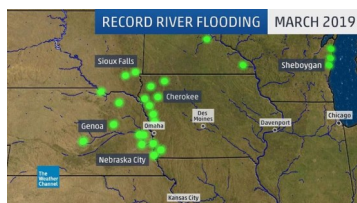

Since 1949, Mental Health America and our affiliates across the country have led the observance of May is Mental Health Month by reaching millions of people through the media, local events and screenings.

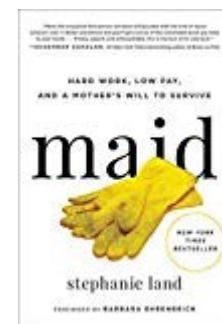

The Road by Cormac McCarthy.

I avoided reading *The Road* for a long time, I am sorry that I had waited so long. *The Road* by Cormac McCarthy is a post-apocalyptic novel about a father and son who trek down a road through trying to survive a world that is destroyed and a crumbling civilization. The story follows them as they try to escape and survive attacks. This is naturalistic look at a world gone awry. Great reading for those who like dystopian fiction, and prepper fiction.

1984 by George Orwell has been a favorite book from high school and remains one now. Orwell is prophetic in showing us not only a world to come, but it shines a light on our current politic and challenges the reader to resist the com-

ing dystopia. *1984* is a must read for every thinking, voting person. Read it and read it often.

Before We Were Yours by Lisa Wingate. When I came to this book, I didn't know what to expect. This book is a story of two sisters and the baby sale industry that was a popular underground, selling children for the highest bidder. Wingate tells the story of two sisters separated by being sold to different homes. This story was brought out by the work of Avery Stafford, who took the time to pull the story from two elderly women. This book is complex and riveting.

Blue like jazz: nonreligious thoughts about Christian spirituality by Donald Miller is the

story of this minister's struggle with the perceived meaninglessness in the modern world. Miller speaks of his journey from strict fundamentalist to becoming a practitioner of what he calls Christian Spirituality. He speaks of moving from a doctrinal centered religion to a language of personal relationship with God. *Blue Like Jazz* is a story of Christian journey as opposed to a set religion. Like jazz, this book follows the flow of Miller's walk with God.
