Dora and the Lost City of Gold (12/21, 12/23) Find out where things go when they get lost. The Lost City is a





Even though a street has been plowed and sanded, drive carefully, there still many be slippery spots.



Carbon Monoxide

As we have entered the Fall season with winter just weeks away, the colder air has made its presence in Siouxland. Turning on the heaters, and furnaces can be as simple as making setting adjustments and turning them on. Furnaces that have been dormant since last spring might have a layer of dust even a kids toy on or about the heating system which presents issues of burning and melting. The biggest issues fire departments have are gas fired systems that present Carbon Monoxide (CO) concerns. CO is an insidious toxin that seems tailor-made to fool the unsuspecting. It is invisible and colorless, so it can be impossible to detect without specialized equipment. CO poisoning is easily mistaken for the flu because they share many of the same symptoms, including nausea, headaches, and fatigue. And the risk of CO poisoning is greatest during these ensuing cold months of flu season.

How do you recognize potential sources of CO build-ups? Any gas fired system must have a flue, a venting source to the outside. Water heaters have a conical shaped riser above the vent which oftentimes becomes bumped and disconnected thus allowing improper venting of the burnt gases. Checking that pilot lights remain lit to reduce even natural or LP gas buildup is important. Check to assure that flue vent piping are not disconnected, or even holes in the pipe are a must to have examined by heating professionals.

The greatest defense in all this is to purchase a CO detector and install it according to the UL listed directions. If you already have them, then change out the batteries as you would for your smoke detector and fire alarm systems.

And, don't be fooled by the flu, that can also be an issue compiled by improperly vented gas appliances. The remedy for the flu can be fatal if a person is actually suffering from CO poisoning. For the flu, it's best to stay at home and rest. But, if CO is present, immediate evacuation is the best case response. Unfortunately it is not uncommon for victims of CO poisoning to be sent back home to rest-right back to the toxic environment that sent them to the hospital in the first place.

Signs and symptomology: Nausea, feeling sick to your stomach, Headaches that will not go away Remedies:

Install CO detectors Change out batteries

Get outside and call 9-1-1

Air out the house

Check all flue pipe connections

Have a professional service technician check out your heating system

Finally, if you think you might have a CO problem, dial 9-1-1 and ask for the fire department to come out and check your house

To ensure the safety of all South Sioux City Pedestrians it is required that:


All sidewalks within the business district be cleaned within 5 hours after the cessation of a storm, unless the storm, or fall of snow, has taken place during the night; in which case the sidewalk shall be cleaned before 8:30 a.m. the next morning.

Sidewalks within the residential areas MUST be cleaned within 12 hours after the cessation of any storm. If a property owner fails to keep their sidewalks clean, the city will notify the property owner or post a sign on the property ordering the work done immediately and failure to comply with this order will constitute a misdemeanor. The city will then clean the sidewalk and the total expenses will be charged against the property as a special assessment for improvement or may be recovered by civil suit brought by the city against the owner or occupant of the property.

Residences cannot push sidewalk or parking or driveway snow onto any City Street.

Only Dakota Ave businesses may move their sidewalk snow onto Dakota Ave, prior to, snow removal off Dakota Ave by the City, and NO PARKING LOT snow can be pushed onto Dakota Avenue at any time.

Nebraska Radon Resistant New Construction (RRNC) Summary of the Law Effective September 1, 2019



The purpose of the Radon Resistant New Construction Act is to protect public health and welfare from exposure to radon, the second leading cause of lung cancer next to smoking. RRNC utilizes design elements and construction techniques that passively resist radon entry and prepare a building for an active post construction mitigation system.

LB130 amends the state building code to adopt sections of the International Building Code (IBC), the

International Residential Code (IRC), and the International Existing Building Code. It requires those standards and the minimum standards for RRNC adopted under section 76-3504 to be enforced by a county, city, or village as part of its local building code if they adopt or generally conform to the state building code.

The building code requires that a passive radon mitigation system be installed in all new construction residential dwellings and original construction commercial structures. New construction does not include additions or remodeling of existing structures.

These passive systems could be activated by the building contractor or a subcontractor of the building contractor.

While passive radon systems contain only 2 elements, a radon vent pipe and a physical barrier between the soil and house foundation, RRNC utilizes 4 approaches to reduce radon levels in buildings:

- Prevent radon entry by using barrier methods.
- Reduce the radon entry driving forces.
- Use passive radon reduction techniques to cause an upward movement of air inside a radon pipe and allow that air to escape through a supplied opening, thus reducing radon levels in the home.
- Prepare the building for possible radon system activation by installing electrical components, sump pit lid requirements and pipe run selection.

New construction after the effective date shall not be required to use RRNC if:

- > the building uses the design of and architect or licensed engineer
- > the building is located in a Zone 3 county with an average radon level of 2.7 pCi/l
- for other than a residential building, it is determined by a local building official that RRNC is not necessary
