## ANNIVERSARY OF THE CIVIL RIGHTS ACT OF 1968, APRIL 11TH





### STAFF RECOMMENDATIONS

Holy Hannah by Will Dinski This is a graphic novel that tells the story of Hannah, a reclusive programmer, who creates a mobile app. The tale brings Hannah in contact with a church that is brought beck together by the app. The novel hits on topics of loneliness, community, and the power of cults. I enjoyed this book intensely. I am a reclusive person by nature. I like everybody, but find close relationships heard. This is a recipe for toxic relationships, psychologically unhealthy churches, and the danger of cults. I was worried about cults, when I was in my teens. This book hearkens back to that era and the times we live in today.

**Blues Reviews:** This month we recommend two blues albums from Buddy Guy Born to Play the Guitar and The Blues is Alive and Well.

Born to Play the Guitar has a dark feel to me. The title cut introduces the artist to the new listener. Back Up Mama is a fun song to hear. (Baby) You've Got What it Takes with Joss Stone is a fun track, Finally Come Back Muddy is a tribute to the great Muddy Waters. Van Morrison and others join Buddy on several cuts.

The Blues is Alive and Well is a more upbeat offering. Buddy is joined by Mick Jagger, Keith Richards, Jeff Beck and others. Key cuts on this CD are the title cut, Cognac, You Do the Time, Guilty as Charged, and The End of the Line.

Three CCM Titles CCM,
Contemporary Christian Music is a popular alternative for positive, popular music. Jeremy
Camp is a mainstay of the genre.

I Still Believe the number one Collection is full of popular titles from the last two decades. I Still Believe is my favorite.

Deeper Roots: Where the Bluegrass Grows is the lasts recording from Steven Curtis Chapman The title cut is an original recording. Dive is a bluegrass version of one of Chapman's Contemporary Christian days. The rest of the songs are bluegrass takes on some of the great hymns of the faith. By far this is the best CD on the list.

Haven't Seen It Yet by Danny Gokey is the greatest surprise to me. It had been a nominee for a Grammy. The album is full of great cuts with a nice
