Elder Abuse

Each year many people are abused, neglected, and exploited. One type that is very problematic and goes unseen is elder abuse. This type of abuse typically happens with persons, male or female, who are 65+ and older. These individuals can be frail, weak, or mentally incompetent to take care of themselves. Victims usually have a trusting relationship with the abuser such as a spouse, adult children, family member, relative or caregiver.

What Is the Long-Term Effect of Abuse?

Most physical wounds heal in time. But, any type of mistreatment can leave the abused person feeling fearful and depressed. Sometimes, the victim thinks the abuse is his or her fault. Protective services agencies can suggest support groups and counseling that can help the abused person heal the emotional wounds.

Types of Abuse:

Physical abuse happens when someone causes bodily harm by hitting, pushing, or slapping.

Emotional abuse, sometimes called psychological abuse, can include a caregiver saying hurtful words, yelling, threatening, or repeatedly ignoring the older person. Keeping that person from seeing close friends and relatives is another form of emotional abuse.

Neglect occurs when the caregiver does not try to respond to the older person's needs.

Abandonment is leaving a senior alone without planning for his or her care.

Sexual abuse involves a caregiver forcing an older adult to watch or be part of sexual acts.

If you think someone you know is being abused—physically, emotionally, or financially—talk with him or her when the two of you are alone. You could say you think something is wrong and you're worried. Offer to take him or her to get help, for instance, at a local adult protective services agency. Elder abuse is a serious crime that needs more awareness. The elderly may not have the power or voice to speak up, but you can for them. For more information, please visit:

Your Trees Need Your Help

The drought across our region, especially in eastern Nebraska, is intensifying and quickly becoming one for the record books. Both the Lincoln and Omaha areas are experiencing one of the driest stretches on record at a time of year that is normally our wettest. According to NSA Green Infrastructure Coordinator Justin Evertson, "This drought is shaping up to be worse than 2011-2012, which was a horrible tree killer."

The good news is, we can help ease the stress that the trees are experiencing right now by giving them some supplemental water, especially to newly established trees (those planted in the last two years) and to trees that are less hardy in times of drought.

Here are some handy watering tips from Justin:

- -- Give newly planted trees 5-10 gallons (depending on the size of the tree) at least once a week . The larger the root ball, the more water is needed.
- -- Know the species of your established trees. Some species like bur oak, red cedar, hackberry, honey locust, Kentucky coffee tree, elm, linden and silver maple are more drought-tolerant than red maple, birch, magnolia, tulip tree, white pine and serviceberry. Using a soaker hose is a good idea for watering the broader-stretching root zones of established trees. Perhaps try to water every other week for established trees.
- -- Take note of location. Trees on north-facing slopes, at the bottom of hills or in irrigated landscapes will likely need less water than those at the top of slopes or facing south or west.
- -- Notice if there are shrubs or groundcover surrounding or near the tree trunks, which will help to keep the trees more moist than those planted in unirrigated lawn.
- -- Mulch around your young trees generously to help bolster their drought resistance.
- -- When in doubt, use more of your water resources on trees than on your lawn; it's easier (and less expensive) to reinvigorate a lawn after a drought than it is to replace mature trees and shrubs.
