

Elder Abuse

Each year many people are abused, neglected, and exploited. One type that is very problematic and goes unseen is elder abuse. This type of abuse typically happens with persons, male or female, who are 65+ and older. These individuals can be frail, weak, or mentally incompetent to take care of themselves. According to the National Domestic Violence Hotline, abuse is about power and control, people with disabilities may face unique challenges and barriers to accessing support. An abuser can be anyone however the vast majority of abusers 90% are family members who are most often adult children, spouses, or partners. Elder abuse can also include abuse in retirement homes, hospitals, and/or hired caregivers. Elder abuse includes, but is not limited to, physical abuse, sexual abuse, neglect, exploitation, emotional abuse, abandonment, and self-neglect. Please be alert and attentive as the suffering is often in silence. In most cases elder abuse goes unreported because the elderly may be reluctant to report their own children or in most cases they fear retaliation. According to Elder Abuse and Neglect, many of the signs and symptoms of elder abuse do overlap with symptoms of mental deterioration, but that doesn't mean you should dismiss them on the caregiver's say-so. Please be on the lookout for signs of elder abuse.

Bruises, pressure marks, broken bones, abrasions, and burns may be an indication of physical abuse, neglect, or mistreatment.

Unexplained withdrawal from normal activities, a sudden change in alertness, and unusual depression may be indicators of emotional abuse.

Bruises around the breasts or genital area can occur from sexual abuse.

Sudden changes in financial situations may be the result of exploitation.

Bedsores, unattended medical needs, poor hygiene, and unusual weight loss are indicators of possible neglect. Behavior such as belittling, threats and other use of power and control by spouses are indicators of verbal or emotional abuse.

Strained or tense relationships, frequent arguments between the caregiver and elderly person are also signs.

If you suspect or know someone who is suffering from elder abuse, please contact your local law enforcement or adult protective services. Adult protective services can be reached at 1-888-493-9929 or locally at 402-241-0032. This is a serious crime that needs more awareness. The elderly may not have the power or voice to speak up, buy you can for them.
